WGS Chair Jocelyn Viterna will give the opening remarks at Gender and Climate Change: An Intersectional Approach from Latin America and the Caribbean at Harvard's David Rockefeller Center for Latin American Studies (DRCLAS).

This event will be held on Tuesday, November 7, 2023, from 4:30 PM to 7:30 PM, and aims to create a space for an overview of the intersection between climate change and gender—emphasizing the need for a nuanced understanding of its impacts in Latin America & the Caribbean—and to share efforts on how addressing gender disparities can enhance climate resilience, mitigation, and adaptation efforts.

Blain, professor of Africana Studies and history at Brown University, a recent Guggenheim Fellow and Carnegie Fellow, is one of the most innovative and influential young historians of her generation.
