Boston's Night of Horror

Nov. 28, 1942 ... Cocoanut Grove ... 492 Died

Twenty-four years ago Monday, Boston went through its night of infamy. Just after 10 p.m. on Nov. 28, 1942, a Saturday night, fire broke out in the basement of the Cocoanut Grove nightclub in the city's theater district.

Hundreds died, caught in the panic of a flash fire fed by cloth decorations of the Melody Lounge or trapped by a jammed revolving door.

Scores lingered in Boston hospitals and died later of burns and pneumonia caused by the inhalation of poisonous fumes.

The death toll was 492. Today, the site of the Cocoanut Grove holocaust is indistinguishable. A blacktopped parking lot fills the spot. No marker signifies the site of New England's worst fire.

Smoking is outlawed in stores and theaters. Outward-opening doors are mandatory on all public buildings.

Out of the tragedy, too, came invaluable medical techniques and treatments for the badly burned.

And, for as long as they live, to a select group of people—the survivors of the Cocoanut Grove—the date for Thanksgiving is always Nov. 28.

A 55-year-old Cambridge man was killed at 4:15 a.m. Saturday when the car he was driving was in collision with a Boston & Maine freight train at the Willow st., Somerville, crossing.

Bernard McGinnity, 45 Stearns st., had been thrown from the car. His body was found near the wreckage and was taken to Somerville Hospital.

His death brought the Massachusetts Thanksgiving week-end highway death toll to seven. The New England toll stood at 18.

Robert Movercock, 44, of Mechanicville, N.Y., the engineer, said the train approached the crossing at 25 m.p.h. Signals at the crossing—bells and lights—were working, he said.

He said the driver apparently didn't see the signals because the auto rolled into the train's path.

A son of the dead man took exception to the engineer's report of the accident. He said his father had traveled the same route at the same time each morning during his 35 years' employment as a bakery driver.

In Wroton, west of Chicago, a 19-year-old Chester man Richard Hitchcock, was killed Saturday when his father injured when they were struck by a hit-train.

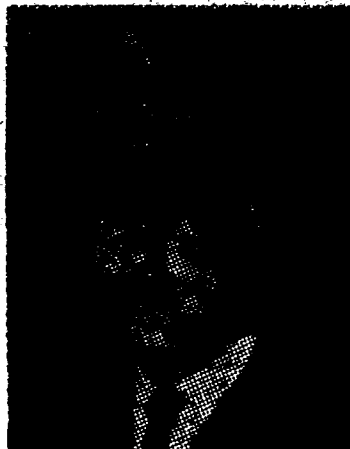

Mr. Jacobs died unexpectedly Friday at his home, 129 Elm Hill av., Dorchester.

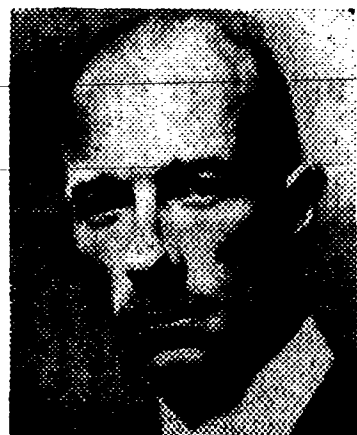
Over the years he befriended and counseled virtually hundreds of boys in the Roxbury area, many who now are business and professional leaders of Greater Boston. He retired in 1962.
