Gen Ramcke, A Top Hitler Commander

KAPPELN, Germany — Gen Bernhard Ramcke, commander of German parachute troops during World War II, died here Thursday, a spokesman announced Saturday. He was 79.

Gen Ramcke was one of Adolf Hitler's most decorated officers.

He was taken prisoner by U.S. troops after the battle of Brest on Sept. 20, 1944. A French court charged him with war crimes and sentenced him to five years in prison in 1951 but he was released shortly afterward because of failing health.
